Topics for this half term: All About Me, The Little Red Hen

We will also begin to learn about our how our brains grow and to develop children's growth mindset through stories and art.

Through these topics, the children will be learning to:

Explore the use of lines, dots and circles in art Become familiar with traditional tales and explore the concept Use scissors correctly to cut around lines of "Harvest" through the story of "The Little Red Hen", Join in with class songs and rhymes grinding wheat, making and baking bread Develop rhythm and rhyme through stories and songs Explore nature in Autumn Have the opportunity to use various musical instruments Use the interactive white board and explore the sounds that they make Use the listening centre for stories and songs

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT	PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT
Listen and follow instructions in PE Travel in different ways and at various speeds Use the climbing equipment safely in the playground and in the Year R garden Develop fine motor skills using jigsaws, construction, beads, scissors, threading, playdough, etc. PE will be on a Wednesday morning and children will come to school dressed in their PE kit.	Settle into school and understand the class routines Develop confidence, self-help skills and independence Develop appropriate behaviour and follow the school rules: ready, respectful, safe Be responsible for their own belongings in the classroom and when getting ready to go home Share and co-operate with others through play Build concentration and perseverance Participate during review time and begin to explain the learning they have done in more detail, making suggestions for how to improve or change their plan

COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

We will start the new academic year with a focus on what are we hoping for in terms of our learning, our friendships and our new class.

We will continue to make explicit links with our core Christian values of Love, Hope and faith and with the British values wherever possible (which are democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance for those of different faiths and beliefs).

HOMEWORK

Ideally we would like you to spend a little time each day supporting your child with some learning at home. We find 'little and often' works more effectively than sitting for long periods at a time. Try to find 5-10 minutes twice a day to work with your child on the things below:

Number

Practise counting forwards to 10 and back again. If your child needs more challenge, count up to 20 and back. A simple way to do this is to count each stair as they go up and count backwards as they come down again.

Practise counting objects accurately, saying the number name as they point to each object. We will teach the children to put a set of objects in a well-spaced line to avoid mis-counting and to touch each object as they count it.

Phonics

Please practise the sounds using the cards provided for a few minutes every day. For each letter card you hold up, your child should be able to say the sound and show you an action. For each sound you say, your child should be able to point to the matching letter.

New sound cards will be sent home every Friday accompanied with the story and action to match the letter sound.

Play 'I spy' focusing on the sounds we have learnt at school.

Reading

Once your child has learnt a collection of letter sounds and is beginning to blend, we will send a book home for you to read with them and a set of tricky words to learn by sight. We will also send home picture books to familiarise your child with the characters and provide opportunities for your child to tell their own story using story language, to predict and to discuss the main themes. Please read / share the pictures book with your child every day and practise reading the tricky words provided. When you do this, please comment in the Link Book to inform us of what you and your child have been working on.

Finally, remember to find time each day to read a story to your child – making this part of the bedtime routine often works really well.

Writing

Please help your child to practise writing their first name using the correct letter formation and pen / pencil grip. A name card will be sent home to support them with this. Once they can accurately trace over their name, please practise writing on paper – copying first and then moving on to writing from memory.

When they are ready, children will also bring home 'tricky words' to practise writing. It is really important that your child holds their pen / pencil correctly and forms each letter correctly as bad habits are extremely hard to break once they have become ingrained.

We will give you more information about supporting your child at home at our Learning, English and Maths presentation at the beginning of October.

We are looking forward to the year ahead and hope you and your child have a great Reception year.
