Year R Autumn 2 Term 2023 – Topic Information for Parents

Topics: Seasonal changes, Growth Mindset, The Christmas Story

This half term we will continue exploring the wonderful season of autumn and the changes we notice as winter creeps in. Alongside this, we will continue to introduce the Learning Powers and work on developing a growth mindset. During the last few weeks of term, we will learn about the Christmas story and spend time practising for our Nativity performance.

LITERACY	MATHS
Reading This half term, we will learning to: - handle, enjoy and discuss a wide variety of books in the classroom and library. - understand book terminology for fiction books such as author, cover, title, page, pictures etc - Recognise all letter sounds and names that we have learned so far and begin to blend them together to form simple words e.g.: up, at, in, dog, bed, hen, frog, lamp, tent - Read some Year R tricky words eg and, the, to, I Writing This half term, we will be learning to: - develop fine motor skills to strengthen fingers for writing. - write the correct letter in response to the spoken sound using the correct formation. - use writing in play and say what they have written. - hear the sounds in, and write, simple CVC words without help. e.g.: cat, mat, pot, dog, tap, pat, pit etc. Most children should now be able to write their own first name. Please continue to support them to do this using the correct letter formation and correct tripod pencil grip.	This half term, we will be learning to: - Rote count to 20 using the 'teen' suffix rather than 'ty' - Count on from any given start number e.g.: Adult says 2,3 child says 4,5,6. Adult says 6,7,8 child says 9,10,11 - Recognise numbers to 10 and place them in the correct order - Write the numeral in response to the spoken number, using the correct number formation. - Match a set of objects to a number - Compare two sets and say which set has more/most or less/least/fewer/fewest - Combine 2 sets of objects and begin to use the language of "add" and "altogether" - Begin to think of ways to record our thinking and learning - Understand and use the language of heavier / lighter / longer / shorter and be able to compare to weights and lengths - Understand positions such as: behind, next to, between, in front of COMMUNICATION AND LANGUAGE <u>Speaking and Listening</u> This half term, we will be learning to: - Develop speaking and listening skills, such as waiting while others are talking, looking at the person you are talking to, respond appropriately to someone who is talking to you, ask questions to find out more - Follow instructions the first time they are given - Express ourselves in a small group and show others that you are listening to them - Help each other in class and talk about the way to be a good friend

COLLECT	IVE WORSHIP

We will start the new academic year with a focus on what are we hoping for in terms of our learning, our friendships and our new class.

We will continue to make explicit links with our core Christian values of Love, Hope and faith and with the British values wherever possible (which are democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance for those of different faiths and beliefs).

HOMEWORK

Ideally we would like you to spend a little time each day supporting your child with some learning at home. We find 'little and often' works more effectively than sitting for long periods at a time. Try to find 5-10 minutes twice a day to work with your child on the things below:

Reading / Phonics – Use the sound cards we send home to practise sounds daily – show your child a letter and ask them to say the sound and do the action. Lay the letter cards out, say a sound and ask your child to select the matching card. Once your child is able to blend sounds to read a few words, we will send a book home for you to read with them and sets of tricky words to learn. Please read with your child every day if you can and practise reading and spelling their tricky words. As well as reading the words in the books, it is important that you discuss the story and ask your child lots of questions to develop their comprehension skills. Continue to encourage storytelling using the picture books we send home – this is an important skill in being a writer later on.

Please comment in the Link Book to inform us of what you and your child have done as this helps us to move them on quicker. Reading books will be changed once a week when they have been read at home and at school.

Finally, remember to find time each day to read a story to your child – making this part of the bedtime routine often works really well.

Writing - Please continue to help your child practise writing their name and the tricky words we send home – copying at first and then from memory. Please ensure your child is holding their pen or pencil correctly and using **the correct letter formation**. All lower case letters start at the top (except 'd' and 'e'). It is really important that your child holds their pen / pencil correctly and forms each letter correctly as bad habits are extremely hard to break once they have become ingrained.

Number – Practise counting forwards and backwards from different start numbers. Count anything and everything – remembering to touch each item for accuracy. Please help your child to recognise numbers to 10 and put them in the correct order. Once they can recognise them, they could practise writing them using the correct formation. If they can do this, please extend to numbers to 20. Ask your child to say the number that is one more or one less than a given number (up to 10). Use the language of measure in everyday activities – weighing ingredients, measuring and comparing length / height, exploring capacity in the bath, etc...
